

DURBANVILLE GOLF CLUB COURSE REPORT July 2017

Introduction

As my last weekend of leave approaches, the one thing I have realised as a green keeper is that you never leave your job, the surrounds merely change. Although you know the course is in good hands, your mind is constantly wondering what is going on and how your team is performing in your absence. You also hope that the last tasks you wanted to complete before going on leave were successful and that when you get back you merely continue where you left off. I was in regular contact with my supervisor Mavuso over these last 2 weeks and he seemed to handle all that was thrown at him judging by the compliments and has certainly earned his break.


Greens:

It seems I should stay away longer as the greens were great in my absence judging by a few of the comments from the clubhouse. There was a bit of Fusarium disease pressure before I left but we sprayed quickly and stopped the disease before it got any worse. So at this stage I am happy with the greens and we will continue with our programmes. I would like to vertidrain them in the beginning of August to relieve some of the compaction and allow the continued downward movement of water past the roots.

Tees:

With the geotextile having been removed off the over-seeded 9th and 17th tees, it has revealed a successful procedure. One more fertilisation and a week or two of thickening up, these two tees will be ready for play. The geotextile on the 15th will be removed this week and will be in play very shortly. The new 7th and 17th tees will be fertilised and topdressed once more before being ready for play in the first half of August. We continue to mow with walk-behinds and this is making a difference to the condition of the tees.

Fairways and Rough:

We continue to manage the fairways and keep them mowed as much as possible. You may have noticed we have been mowing in a 2-stripe pattern rather than the back and forth striped pattern. The 2-stripe pattern reduces the amount of turns at the start and end of the fairways which prevents unsightly turn marks and damage. We have kept the mowing height consistent and the condition of the fairways is good, despite the earthworm casts creating a muddy appearance. The rough has come alive with broadleaf weeds and we are spraying this on a regular basis to keep it under control. We continue to treat the moles and this seems to be making a difference.

Bunkers:

The work at the 2nd bunker was completed and we just need to do a little more sodding and tidying to the left of the bunker where the old path used to be. One final fertilisation and top-dressing should see the fluffy grass around the new bunker firm up and become playable. I havent heard any positive or negative feedback on the bunkers while away but will certainly address any issues there may be.

Irrigation and dams:

The work in the pump house is near completion and all that's left to do now is the servicing of the pumps and an audit of the irrigation system in preparation for summer. The top dam has eventually started over-flowing to the bottom dam and one can certainly see the bottom dam level increasing.


