If you miss us at the market, do visit the Sustainability commons at the Moriarty Environmental Centre, Garden Route Botanical Garden, 49 Caledon Street, George during normal working hours.

WESSA implemented the USAID funded Stepping up to Sustainability programme. Visit your local sustainability centre at the botanical garden, to get ideas on living sustainably by:

- reducing, sorting and managing waste better
- installing renewable technologies
- conserving and teaching about water management
- providing experiential courses on biodiversity

About R40 000 of materials was provided to the GR Botanical Garden. This includes two 5 000 I water tanks for rain water harvesting at the propagation yard. Lighting throughout the environmental centre was changed to low energy bulbs and an LED tube. Workshop and course participants learned how to make vertical gardens for growing food in small spaces whilst re-using materials. There are two varieties of sun cookers and a wonder bag which are used to reduce electricity consumption. Compare electricity consumption of different items by visiting the display board and seeing the potential for lighting up small and informal house with LED lights run off small solar panels. The Shack Pack also charges cell phones.

ENVIRONMENTAL UPDATES

A great big feather in our cap for the Garden Route Botanical Garden Trust!

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) has officially been entered into by and between the Garden Route Botanical Garden Trust (GRBGT) and South African National Biodiversity Institute (SANBI). This is really something very special, thank you to all the support and contributions from each of the Members who have helped to make this possible.

Through this MOU, the SANBI formally recognizes and acknowledges the contributions made by the Garden Route Botanical Garden as an associated and SANBI-endorsed botanical garden fulfilling certain criteria established by the SANBI.

The purpose of the MOU is to set out the working relationship between the GRBGT and the SANBI in the following areas:

- 1. Research
- 2. Human Capital Development
- 3. Management of botanical gardens and herbaria and their associated biodiversity collections
- 4. Environmental education and outreach programs
- 5. Collaboration with botanical collections, including field work.

Criteria undertaken by the GRBGT for SANBI endorsement

- Promotes plant conservation / restoration programs
- Promotes environmental education / awareness programs
- Accessible and open to the public
- Makes biodiversity information available to visitors through interpretation (labels, brochures, publications, display boards)
- Promotes biodiversity awareness
- Promotes local heritage / cultural awareness
- Offers natural history courses available to the public
- Vision / Mission / and Business Plan / Model compatible with SANBI mandate

- Promotes the cultivation, display and long-term maintenance of local / regional indigenous
 South African plants and collections
- Includes an herbarium (the Southern Cape Herbarium)
- Promotes plant collections of wild origin
- Committed to staff developments, training and capacity development
- Committed to eradication of alien invasive plants on the estate
- Committed to generating new biodiversity knowledge through research and strategic partnerships
- Committed to promoting sustainable development practices
- Association with, but not necessarily supported financially by, the Botanical Society of South Africa or other relevant environmental NGO's
- Committed to promoting the conservation and awareness of wildlife on the estate.

The aims of the working relationship between the SANBI and the GRBGT are to:

- 1. Maximise the outputs of research programs through developing collaborative projects and building on the critical mass of expertise already in the two institutions
- 2. Avoid duplication of projects and resources
- 3. Enhance training of students in conservation and related studies
- 4. Expose students to possible careers in the biodiversity sector
- 5. Improve the use of available biodiversity information in regional policy development, decision-making and monitoring of the Southern Cape
- 6. Improve the services that each partner can provide to beneficiaries.

What a great achievement!

MMU Professer leads a R 13 million international study on adaptations to climate change

A team of researchers from Arizona State University in the US, CIRAD, IRSTEA and CEFE (France) and Exeter University in the United Kingdom, lead by Professor Christo Fabricius of Nelson Mandela Metropolitan University's Sustainability Research Unit have recently received funding from the Belmont Forum, which includes the National Research Foundation and Dept of Science and Technology, for a three-year study to assess adaptations and perceptions of risk and vulnerability in coastal areas.

Called MAGIC (Multi-scale Adaptations to Global change In Coastlines), this 940 000 Euro (almost R 13 million) project addresses a complex problem: how to best respond to risk and vulnerability in coastal zones. Professor Fabricius will soon depart for France where the team will get together to finalize their research plans, with regular project team meetings being envisaged over the next three years. The project will also involve a group of post-graduate students and for that purpose NMMU has recruited several Master's and Doctoral students specifically for the project.

The project addresses four linked questions: 1) How do people's perceptions of risk and adaptability, and their ability to adapt, influence their decisions and actions? 2) How do such adaptations affect the vulnerability of other groups, places or resources? 3) What happens when people participate in dialogue, social learning and critical thinking? And 4) How do perceptions change when decision makers are actively involved in, learn and reflect together with scientsts?

RHINO FRIDAY

848 poached in SA, so far this year - 2297 rhino poached since 2010 – of which 1343 have been poached out of our Kruger National Park.

Clearly, whatever we are doing is not enough to stem the tide never mind actually put a stop to this. As the year goes by, and as the poaching numbers climb, we become increasingly outraged. Each year, to our horror, the number passes the previous year's record high leaving us who can do very little if anything to stop this, feeling ever more helpless and hopeless.

848 rhino already dead and November & December (historically being the biggest months of the year regarding poaching), upon us, which means that the end figure for the year will leave us reeling like never before.

And then, conveniently, 1 January rolls around and we start with a lovely clean slate... 0 rhino poached...1 rhino poached... and the whole process starts all over again with seemingly no real action plan to stop the poaching of our rhino in its tracks.

MOU's are signed with consumer and trading countries, well – some are still in the draft stage, as yet unsigned...

Diplomatic, behind the scenes meetings are held between SA and these countries...

Experts are brought in, re-employed/consulted... etc, etc... the focus and attention and awareness is there, but the stopping of it all is not! What are we not doing, what could we be doing better or more of, what are we missing or not seeing here?

I believe, that there is ONE thing that South Africa can do to put the brakes on... And it won't cost ONE CENT. With all the monies being donated to the cause, all the monies being spent by NGO's/NPO's, all the monies raised for rhino but never actually seeing the rhino, all the monies being spent to protect rhino by both SANParks and private rhino owners, the ONE thing than be done that will not costs a cent, is the very thing not being done...

Our rhino need to be declared a protected species by Number One, nothing less will do the trick. A strong, clear and vocal message must go out that our rhino have the President's Protection, that anyone who harms our rhino can be expected to feel the full might and weight of the law. That a **ZERO TOLERANCE** stance has been taken, mark the day, sign, frame and hang an official decree up for the world to see!

Why not, nothing else is doing the trick, just do it, it won't cost a cent, and it may just turn the tide! FLIGHT FOR BIRDERS COURSE 23 and 24 January 2014 A 2 day bird identification course for novice and intermediate bird-watchers by Dr Anton Odendal - Patria Family Church, George

In 2014 we will be celebrating the 10th anniversary of the course and we will be celebrating our country's birds with photographs of some of the top wildlife photographers in South Africa. Part of the proceeds will be donated to Black Harrier conservation.

We will also again be doing the course at Plettenberg Bay on 30 and 30 January for the area between Knysna and Tsitsikamma. The course is currently being adapted to local conditions and we are drafting regional specific formats, particularly for more difficult sections such as birds of prey and LBJ's. Individuals who would like to know more about birding and their local birds are welcome although the main target groups are those people working in the conservation and tourism industries.

The costs include the course manual and a certificate endorsed by BirdLife South Africa – roughly 1,600 slides and drawings will be used. The contents of the course get updated every second year and this has now been done – in many cases images of similar and potentially confusing species have been combined on the same slide in order to illustrate differences. The development of an infrastructure for birding tourists in local areas will also be highlighted. In the vast majority of the slides English and Afrikaans names of species are printed onto the slide. The course focuses on basic steps in the identification of birds, places heavy emphasis on where to find the rare and often endemic birds in southern Africa and illustrates how ordinary bird-watchers could become involved

in the conservation of birds and their habitats. A new addition to the course is a section focusing on the differences between the various families of LBJ's and how this applies to the region where the course is being presented.
